Appendix C – Community Criteria

Community criteria were put the same level of importance as regulatory criteria. The community criteria were divided into placement opportunities and avoidance areas:

- **Placement Opportunities:** Areas that should be considered for a route because land uses and designations are compatible with the construction, operation, and maintenance of a transmission line
- **Avoidance Areas:** Areas that should be avoided unless there are no reasonable alternatives. Can range from very low to high impacts and mitigation may be easily implemented or very difficult or infeasible to implement
